Shelley and I go way back! Thirty years ago, I walked through the front doors of the Taylor Building for my interview as a "Family Visitor" in The Cridge's new Family Daycare Program. I was greeted by Patricia Bailey and Shelley Morris in the front office. As the Family Daycare Program evolved, I moved on to the women's anti-violence programs, and Shelley took on more and more responsibility for the entire organization's finances.

Whatever responsibility or challenge arises, Shelley brings her clear thinking, common sense, humour and incredible knowledge. But most of all, Shelley brings her heart. Shelley just makes everyone feel loved. No matter how busy, she has always delighted in our stories about our children and grandchildren. She has prayed fervently for them when they have struggled and celebrated their joys.

During some really challenging years, Shelley's ability to lead, to help us overcome our fears and do what is right, got us through. It was clear that she was just what The Cridge needed for a CEO. How could that be 14 years ago now?

Shelley's love and respect for every individual was so evident in her speech at the December 6, 2018, ceremony for the National Day of Remembrance on the grounds of the Legislature:

Our staff and volunteers pour their hearts into comforting, protecting and serving the courageous women impacted by violence – and make no mistake – it is hard and gut-wrenching work. BUT it also makes our hearts EXPLODE with admiration and thankfulness to see women refuse to be defined by the violence perpetrated against them, women who are overcomers, whether as gentle spirits or unbreakable warriors.

I have spent 99% of my working life working with Shelley. It is hard to imagine working without her. I keep thinking of Winnie the Pooh saying: "Goodbye? Oh no, please. Can't we go back to page one and do it all over again?" But then, the ever-wise Winnie also says: "How lucky I am to have something that makes saying goodbye so hard." 

Chef's Corner:

Nik Milonas, Executive Chef of The Cridge Village Seniors' Services

Shelley's Ginger Garlic Prawns with Jasmine Rice and Sesame Sauce

Yield: 2 pounds or 46 prawns - your choice of a serving portion

2 pounds ocean wise peeled and deveined raw frozen prawns thawed or fresh if available Marinade:

1/3 cup minced fresh ginger
1/3 cup minced fresh garlic
1/3 cup light soy sauce
1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
3 Tbsp. fresh lime juice

A few drops of tabasco sauce or more 1/3 cup unsalted butter melted

1/3 cup olive oil

Method: Preheat oven to 450°F. Rinse prawns under cold water and pat dry. Combine all marinade ingredients in a large mixing bowl and whisk together vigorously. Add the prawns and thoroughly coat with the marinade. Slide everything onto a parchment-lined cookie sheet large enough to hold the prawns, leaving some space in between. Roast prawns for 5 to 7 minutes to 71°C using a probe thermometer. Serve immediately. Cook the Jasmine rice as per package directions. To serve, place a mound of rice in the center of a large soup bowl or plate and decorate with the prawns around the rice. Drizzle the sesame sauce on the rice and garnish with lime wedges and fresh chopped cilantro.



Sesame Sauce Yield: 500 ml

150 ml mayo 100 ml tahini 20 ml organic sugar 35 ml rice vinegar 45 ml Japanese soy sauce 25 ml sesame oil 50 ml water

Method: Combine all ingredients in a bowl and whisk until smooth. Taste and adjust seasoning for balance. Store in a container with a tight-fitting lid in the fridge. Bring to room temperature before using. Use on rice or vegetables as a dip.

Once upon a time, long ago, on the top of a hill in a beautiful mansion, The Cridge confreres were taking their break, sitting in the activity room enjoying their lunch while having a friendly conversation amongst each other. It was a daily ritual as they convened to take rest from their full and busy days serving their clients and whoever needed their help that day. There was the usual brigade as you might expect: Sarah,

Tina, Linda, Dave, Candace and the Chef. The ladies usually sat at one end of the table while the men sat on the other, as that was the proper seating arrangement during those times. Everyone was happy and cordial



with each other as they shared stories, laughed and dined together. One day, Shelley, whom Chef really admired, joined in and started sharing a food story of how much she enjoyed Japanese food, especially the tasty rice with that savoury sesame sauce. As the Chef was listening to those eloquent and compelling food words, his ear morphed with acuity into a Spock's ear, and his creative desire was awakened with force equal to Thor's mighty hammer as he was

inspired to create a special dish for his beloved CEO. And friends, this is the true story of how this dish that graces our lunch menu came to be. I admire and adore my CEO and always will. Please enjoy!!


